

### COAST SALISH CANOE IN FRONT OF D.O. PEARSON'S STORE CA. 1908



A traditional Coast Salish canoe used to navigate the flooded waters of Stanwood ca. 1908 by residents seeking supplies. D. O. Pearson and his son Fred are seen standing outside the canoe in front of their store, which was built in 1905. Carved from western red cedar, Native canoes of this area generally ranged from 14 to 26 feet in length. They

were a center piece of the social and spiritual life of the Salish people of the Puget Sound. One such "Grandmother" was returned to the Stillaguamish Tribe in October 2015 by the Stanwood Area Historical Society after 23 years in storage, restoring a vital piece of tribe's cultural heritage.

One of the biggest changes at the Historical Society complex is the remodel at the History Museum that is still in progress. The Society received a \$4000 grant from the Snohomish County Heritage Commission to make repairs and renovations. These included painting and repairing the ramp and adding new lighting and a picture hanging system so all the pictures of graduating classes could be displayed. ### END OF A LONG JOURNEY

It was a day of appreciation, cultural respect and some happy tears. A lost member of the Stillaguamish tribe was going home. The shovel-nose cedar canoe, stolen in the 1960s, was returned to tribal representatives during a ceremonial gathering in October 2015 at the Stanwood Area Historical Society. It is estimated that the 28-foot-long dugout was carved in the mid-1800s and remained in use until the 1950s. It was taken from a riverbank along the Stillaguamish River and became a display at a Camano Island home.

The Historical Society purchased the canoe at an estate sale in 1992. Board member Penny Buse discovered the story of the canoe's illicit removal and worked over several years to return it to its rightful owners. "The canoe has been on a long journey," she told a reporter. "We are so thrilled it's finally going home."

The canoe has undergone some conservation work by Linda Roundhill of Art and Antiquities Conservation. This iconic representation of Stillaguamish culture will be on display during the grand opening of the new Stillaguamish tribal Administration Building starting at 10 a.m. on February 24, 2016. The Administration Building is located at 3322 236th Street NE in Arlington. Tribal Archives Specialist Tracey Boser says that it will have a place of honor beneath a mural of Mt. Higgins and the Stillaguamish River in the atrium of the facility.

Stillaguamish tribal chairman Shawn Yanity told the October gathering of roughly 60 people that "there are teachings in this canoe. . . . We are alive and strong."

### THE PRIDE OF NORWAY VISITS STANWOOD

In 1908, the New Year's ball dropped for the first time in Times Square on January 1st, the Chicago Cubs played for the last time in the World Series and \$825 could buy you a newly produced Ford Model T. And on March 22, 1908 Stanwood enjoyed a special visit by one of the world's great explorers, Norwegian Roald Amundsen.

His Stanwood stop was sandwiched inside a speaking tour intended to raise funds to finance a planned trek to the North Pole. He spoke before packed houses in Tacoma, Seattle and Bellingham among others. Although his itinerary did not list the small town on the Stillaguamish River, its attraction could not be overlooked. It was home to a large Norwegian community and its mayor Andrew Klaeboe was from the same native district in Norway as Amundsen. Local history cites Amundsen and Klaeboe as classmates in their homeland but if true, there was a marked age difference of twelve years. They did both attend Christiana University in today's Oslo where Klaeboe studied drugs and Amundsen medicine, but Klaeboe had immigrated to the United States by the time Amundsen was old enough to enter the school.

Amundsen left his studies at the age of 21 and began working as a deckhand. He advanced to ship's captain mounting expeditions to the Arctic and in 1905 won international acclaim by navigating the Arctic Ocean, crossing from the Atlantic to the Pacific via the long-sought Northwest Passage. Klaeboe managed stores in Wisconsin and South Dakota before migrating to the Pacific Northwest in 1888. He began the first drugstore in Stanwood which was only the second to exist in Snohomish County. From 1896 to 1899 he owned and operated the Occidental Pharmacy in Juneau, Alaska during the gold rush, before returning to Stanwood and opening the Klaeboe Drug Store in a storefront of the new Bank of Stanwood building on Market Street. He was elected mayor of the town in 1905.

City representatives and a large group of citizens gathered at the Great Northern depot to greet Amundsen and manager Harry Randall who arrived on the noon train. Sigurd Hall, president of the Scandinavian Society (later Sons of Norway) gave the welcoming address. A large number of the rural population surrounding Stanwood were sons of Norway, he said, but had become "loyal subjects of Uncle Sam." Amundsen was welcomed

as a "distinguished countryman" whose "achievements add another chapter to the history of Norwegian adventure, navigation and discovery."

A select group of city leaders entertained Amundsen at dinner which took place in the home of Perry Babington. That home today stands at 27115 102nd Ave. NW (Market Street) across from the Pearson heritage home. The Opera House inside the Fraternal Hall (today's Floyd Norgaard Cultural Center) was filled well before it was time for Amundsen to speak. Mayor Klaeboe rose to introduce their honored guest. He praised the courage of the explorer who had gained "an immortal name in history" for having found the northern route between the two great oceans, succeeding where so many had failed. "It remained for a native son of OLD NORWAY to pick that plum!" Klaeboe proudly proclaimed.

Amundsen then led his eager audience

along the route of his famous excursion illustrating the course with maps and views on canvas. "The Eskimo villages and their mode of living were especially brought out by the speaker," reported the Stanwood Tidings.

With news of Robert Peary and Frederick Cook's successful expeditions to the North Pole in 1909, Amundsen diverted his attention to Antarctica and the South Pole which he achieved in December 1911. In 1926 he and pilot Umberto Nobile became the first to overfly the North Pole in an airship. Insufficient documentation by Peary and Cook has led historians to question whether their claims were realized. If so, then Amundsen would be the first man to reach both poles. Amundsen joined in a rescue effort in 1928 to locate Nobile's airship which was missing during another flight to the Arctic. Nobile and his crew were later found but Amundsen's search plane never returned. Some debris was later discovered but the bodies of Amundsen and his crew members were never located. An ending probably Amundsen himself would have approved of and befitting the Norwegian heritage he represented.




