
History of the

Harvest Jubilee

STANWOOD, WASH.

In 1933 the Stanwood Commercial Club sponsored a "Diamond Jubilee" on Aug, 25 & 26. It was designed that year to commemorate the 75th Anniversary of the Founding of Stanwood to "furnish entertainment to the patrons of the town." Festivities that year included visits and speeches from politicians and grange officials. Activities included music, baseball, races of all kinds including Indian canoe races that year.

The following year the Stan-

wood Commercial Club met in a special meeting on July 26 1934 and decided to hold a "Harvest Jubilee." Only a month later, on August 25th the festival was underway! It featured dancing in the IOOF Hall and in addition to the roller skate and bicycle races, kids pet parade, they had a merry-go-round and ferris wheel. There was amateur wrestling and boxing. Howard Wangsness

remembers the carnival wrestlers would challenge the locals but Florence's meat packing businessman, Nels Lindahl, an accomplished wrestler in the area, always Farmers would bring their equipment

and animals, especially notable were Sam Bates large horses. The log bucking and tree felling contests were also very popular events.

towns. That year there were three rides - the ferris wheel, the Octopus and large swings between the Stanwood Hotel and Rosser's grocery (now Pawn Shop). There was a greased pole for a climbing contest in the lot south of the Pearson Store (now Blazing Saddles). She also remembers that the "Beer Barrel Polka" was popular at the time and it was always blaring out into the streets from the tavernsthe Stanwood Hotel, Clyde's Tavern and the Central Tavern.

The Jubilee continued through 1941 when they attracted "seven bands and drum corps that kept the air filled with music and did much to give color to the grand parade in the afternoon. It was the biggest, most spectacular parade that ever marched on Stanwood Streets representing every phase of commercial, agricultural and social and fraternity life."

The June 11, 1942 Twin City News reported the Stanwood Commercial Club decided to sponsor a barbeque and community gathering following discussion of dropping the Harvest Jubilee celebration for the duration of the war. Many assume the Jubilee was the early version of the current August fair, and perhaps in some sense it was. But

beginning in 1937, the Stillaguamish Grange began a separate event they called a festival that took place after the Jubilee in September. For this event too, the other granges, (South Camano, Meadow, and Silvana Granges) and the 4 - H, Future Farmers of America, the High School, many local businesses had booths in addition to the home grown fruits, vegetables, canned goods, fine art and needlework. It took place at the Grange Hall, the just recently purchased former Woodland Tavern. The activities were followed by a dance. By 1958,

the fair had become too large for the Grange to handle and the Fair Board was formed to manage it as a community fair to this day.


