Stanwood West End Historic Brick Streets, 1939



The 1939 (7th Annual) Harvest Jubilee was the Friday and Saturday August 18th. The Stanwood Steam Laundry truck in this photo (front) won 2nd place in the Commercial Float contest. There were two parades and dancing both nights. Carnival attractions included a log bucking contest, competitive marching and drill and a baseball game in the new high school diamond.

Contests included a greased pole climb, Old Wood Face (Impersonation contest?), foot races, flower show, pie eating, egg throwing and other kiddie games. Five bands were featured.

In the front photo on the right behind the laundry truck is the S. A. Thompson Store (right) originally the Irvine Store. It was still operated by the family at the time of this photograph. In 1935 Thompson and family had remodeled it. He died in 1937 and his daughter, Jessie C. Thorpe operated it with many loyal employees until 1946. It was then operated by J.L. Goss until 1954 when it was purchased by Theresa and Les Hagstrom as the Thriftway (United Grocers—Cash & Carry) It changed hands again in 1959 with Ralph & Arlene Godden as owners. In 1964 a new section was called the Hitching Post with more remodels, renamed again in 1965 as the “Serve-U”. In May of 1978 the store caught fire and brought the fire department once again to burned and was not salvageable.

On the left is the Stanwood Hardware & Furniture building purchased in 1937 by Samuel (Dick) Pusey which is still owned by family members. Plans for building include a new art center on the property as soon as funding is in place.

The brick streets are visible in the photograph though they appear widened since 1937 (cover). The City of Stanwood has been studying how to continue to incorporate preservation of the character the bricks into the new designs. They have

received feedback indicating local business owners and other community members wish to preserve the historic character of the West end of Stanwood. There are many other historic buildings everywhere in the city in need of rehabilitation and improvements. We appreciate the example the City is setting in preserving our aging but useful buildings and roadways throughout out town.

New Additions to our Collections!

Thanks to Roseanne Michaels and husband Michael McCormick for driving her family’s Grandfathers Clock all the way from California. It is now a new addition to the D. O. Pearson House Museum. It was owned by Karl Schmidt whose decorated laundry van was in the photograph on the front page.

Karl and his wife Maria came to Stanwood by way of Valdez about 1930 and operated the Stanwood Laundry near the waterfront from the 1930s to 1944. In their early years, the Schmidts made several trips to Germany to see the family. In 1938 they made their last trip but were told they had to leave and return to America because the war was coming. They were unable to see their family again.

Other donations include more womens hats ownd by her mother Ruth Locks Bendixen from Jana Aufai; Margaret Utgard donated a dresser and mirror plus many other documents and small treasures to be featured some day.

Thanks also to the Stillaguamish Valley Museum and Michelle Heiderer and Roy Harris for donating Mark Kimball’s jewelry store ledgers found in their collection. Kimball operated a jewelry and watch store in both sides of town, including the brick road. He was married to Genevieve Pearson in 1926, a granddaughter of D. O. Pearson, the first mayor of Stanwood.

We also appreciate the SVM for temporarily storing our sleigh until we can provide a permanent space (see page 6).

Transition to the Horseless Carriage - not quite complete.

This photograph features Florence Transfer Co., Stage Depot with horse driven with hand crank and two seats and a foldable hood. We are not sure if this is meant to be humorous or the horse is hauling it somewhere for repairs.

Andrew Larson (1862-1935) is the passenger in the car. He was in the livery business about 1909 according to the Polk Directory. He also served as constable in Stanwood.

He and his wife Ida were married in 1886 and came to Florence soon after. The barn was painted red and still standing in Florence until 2005 at least. He also operated a stage between Florence and the depot near Stanwood providing a connection to the depot because the steamboats could not always provide convenient connections at the time.



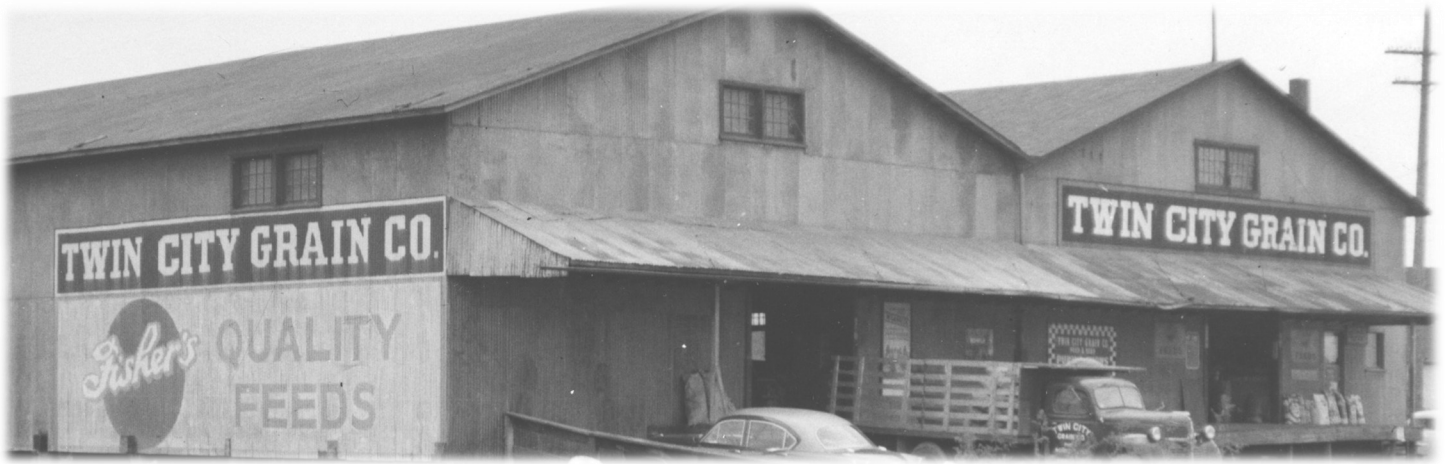
Doctor Allen's Buggy

This beautiful buggy's restoration was recently completed by local resident Larry Hanson at the request of Annabelle and Grace Birkestol. They sold it Larry Hanson in 1998 and he restored it. Larry and Annabelle rode in it in the 1999 and 2000 4th of July Parade.

Dr. Allen was the first doctor in Stanwood who arrived in 1898, established a hospital with Dr. MacEacheran.

Dr. Allen sold his practice and hospital moved to Lake Stevens in 1914. It was purchased by Ole Birkestol who left it to his daughters Annabelle and Grace. It is now stored offsite until we can display it and tell its story. Thank you Larry!





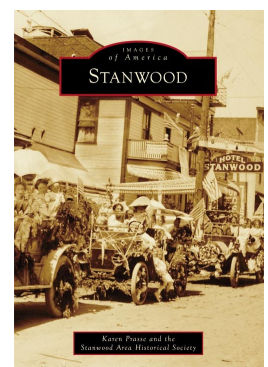
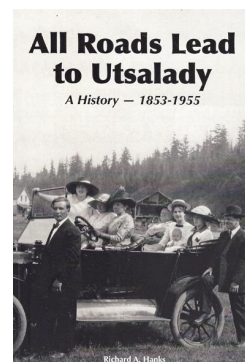
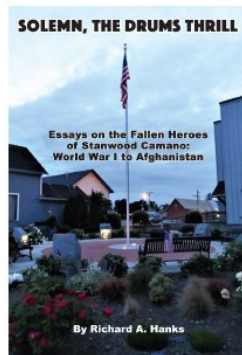
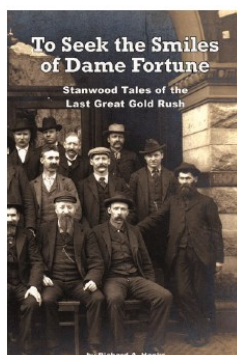
